NEWS MEDIA COVERAGE OF PRESIDENT OBAMA

Results are based on telephone interviews with 1,026 national adults, aged 18+, conducted by Gallup Jan. 20-21, 2010.

For results based on the total sample of National Adults, one can say with 95% confidence that the margin of error is ± 4 percentage points. Interviews are conducted with respondents on land-line telephones and cellular phones. In addition to sampling error, question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of public opinion polls.
